Additional Adult Ed sessions:

May 4 following meeting: "A Report on the FCNL Spring Lobby Weekday" with Nathan Walker. In this session, Nathan will talk about his experience at the FCNL Spring Lobby Workshop, which he describes here. Come to hear how young Friends are making their voices heard in Washington.

"Two weeks ago I attended FCNL's Spring Lobby Weekend in Washington DC. After a red eye flight into the capital, I entered FCNL's Sunday workshop of dedicated panelists and learned a great deal about the US's involvement in foreign military affairs. The discussion left little topic undisturbed as we worked our way through the difficult topics of drone strikes, Guantanamo Bay, and government surveillance. The basic premise for the weekend, however, was the lobbying visit the following day. Over 100 young adults, myself included, took to Capital Hill representative offices and spoke with an official about supporting HR 2324, a bill that would repeal the 2001 Authorization for the Use of Military Force Act. The 2001 AUMF gives the president broad powers to target anyone affiliated with the terrorists behind the World Trade Center bombings and allows the president to take any action necessary to prevent another terrorist attack. I had the privilege of speaking with Rep. Anna Eshoo's staffer, who was quite happy to meet with me and hear my concerns. Overall, the trip was an amazing experience and opportunity for me. I highly recommend other young adults interested in national and foreign affairs to attend next year's weekend!"

The Explosive Emergence of the Quaker Movement in Revolutionary England, 1640-1660

Reading and Discussion Series Led by Paul Seaver

3rd Sunday after Meeting, June 15, 12:25 - 2:00 PM June 22, 29 and July 6, 7:00 - 8:30 PM

Lecturing and leading the discussions will be Paul Seaver, Emeritus Professor of History at Stanford. Paul specializes in early modern English history, exactly the period in which Quakerism arose. For that reason, **this study series is rated "Do Not Miss."**

The two decades between 1640 and 1660 witnessed tremendous political and religious upheaval in England. Following civil wars in the 1640's King Charles I was executed and England became first a commonwealth and then a "Parliamentary republic" under Lord Protector Oliver Cromwell. The revolution disintegrated following Cromwell's death in 1658, and the monarchy was restored under King Charles II in 1660.

In the same period the Puritan wing of the Established Church was disintegrating, challenged by Presbyterian, Independent (Congregational) and Baptist movements. By the late 1640's and early 50's further religious movements were emerging such as Fifth Monarchists, Ranters and the Muggletonians.

It was in this roiling cauldron of political and religious ferment that Quakerism also emerged, the traditional "birth year" usually reckoned to be 1652. For this study series Paul has collected a range of original documents illustrating the historical context and political/religious debates that were raging. Xeroxed reading materials will be distributed before the first session.
